Survey background and methods

- > 3rd time conducting the NYC Resident Feedback Survey
 - Previous iterations in 2008 and 2017
- > Data collection:
 - Probability-based, mail-based sample of 125,851 households
 - Multi-contact, multi-mode approach (postcard + printed survey + postcard)
 - Data collected from September 14th to December 18th, 2023
- > 6,632 total responses received, for a 5.3% overall response rate
- > 95% confidence interval
 - ±1 percentage point for overall results
 - Between ±2 and 6 percentage points within borough
 - ±10 percentage points within Community Board
- > Statistically weighted to reflect demographic profile within Community Board

Data collection goals and outcomes


Goals:

- 100 completed surveys per Community Board (CB)
- About 6,000 total surveys

Outcomes:

- 48 CBs with 100+ surveys
- 11 CBs with 90-99 surveys
 - Total of 6,632 surveys
 - 3,911 paper
 - 2,721 online

Number of Responses by Community Board







The survey included 68 evaluative items








62 evaluative items could be compared to 2017










Big Picture





Neighborhood as a place to live






Excellent or good 50%

5 in 10

In 2017, the neighborhood as a place to live was rated excellent or good by 6 in 10.



Quality of life in NYC





Excellent or good 30%

3 in 10

In 2017, the quality of life in NYC was rated excellent or good by 51% of the residents.




2017 Results



Overall quality of NYC government services





Excellent or good 24%

2 in 10

In 2017, the NYC government services were rated excellent or good by 44% of the residents.



Spends tax dollars wisely






Excellent or good 11%

In 2017, 21% of the residents rated as excellent or good the way the City spent tax dollars.



City promotes the economic growth of New York City






Excellent or good 24%

In 2017, 41% of the residents rated as excellent or good the way the City promoted economic growth.



In 2017, 38% of residents rated as excellent or good the overall ease of travel within the city.




Big Picture ratings (2023 & 2017)

Quality of Life: Non-Safety





Buckets of satisfaction



Sorted the items into four "buckets"

- Happy: Greater than 65% rated positive
- Satisfied: Between 50-64.9%
- Dissatisfied: Between 35-49.9%
- Unhappy: Less than 35%




Satisfaction with the 9 Quality of Life: Non-Safety items


Satisfaction with the 9 safety items



Substantial Disparities: >12%












Overall income disparities

Small 16 items (33%)


Substantial: >12%


Small: -6% - 6%


Inverted: <-6%




* Graph displays the percentage of items falling in each category in each survey year.
